Advice to Applicants – 2011

INTERNATIONAL POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS

Applications are invited for qualified international students to undertake a Doctor of Philosophy or Masters by Research degree at Edith Cowan University with an Endeavour International Postgraduate Research Scholarship (EIPRS) or an ECU International Postgraduate Research Scholarship (ECU-IPRS) to cover course tuition fees and medical insurance. The University will also provide a living allowance, ECU International Stipend (ECUIS) currently AUD\$25,000 tax free (2010 rate) to be paid to the recipient on a fortnightly basis.

*Please note that an Application for IPRS scholarship is a separate process to applying for admission into a course. APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible for a new 2011 Endeavour IPRS, an applicant must meet ALL of the following criteria:

- must** be a citizen of any country other than Australia or New Zealand and not eligible for study under the Research Training Scheme (RTS) at the commencement of the Higher Degree by Research (HDR);
- must** meet international student visa requirements as specified by the Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC), including the requirement to purchase and maintain a standard Overseas Student Health Cover policy approved by the Commonwealth Government Department of Health and Ageing;
- must** be commencing full time **and** on-campus enrolment for the first time in a Higher Degree by Research. Edith Cowan University may also consider students who commenced:
 - their higher degree by research in the previous year but who, due to the timing of their application and subsequent enrolment, were unable to apply for an EIPRS in that year; or
 - a higher degree by research at an eligible provider and terminated that enrolment within six months of commencement.
 - Where an applicant applies for an EIPRS and is unsuccessful but enrolls into the higher degree anyway, they will be considered ineligible to apply for the EIPRS after their enrolment.

Students already enrolled in their higher degree by research at ECU are not eligible to apply for an EIPRS unless they applied for and commenced their degree after 31 August 2010. This would indicate that the student did not have an opportunity to apply for an EIPRS in the previous year.

Enrolled students wishing to seek clarification on this matter should contact the Research Scholarships Officer.

- must** intend to undertake study in a course and research topic within one of the University's research strengths (refer to the 'Research Strengths' section of this document);

- must** hold a degree equivalent to an Australian first class honours or Australian *Master by Research* degree as determined by the ECU Research Students and Scholarships Committee (RSSC);
- must** meet all University admission requirements, including English proficiency, and be made an unconditional offer of a place in a higher degree by research (either a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) or Master by Research) before a scholarship can be offered;
- must not** have already obtained a Research Doctorate, which is deemed the equivalent of an Australian Research Doctorate degree;
- must not** have already obtained a Master by Research degree which is deemed the equivalent of an Australian Master by Research degree if seeking admission to another Master by Research degree;
- must not** currently be receiving a scholarship provided by the Australian Agency for International Development (AusAID) or have completed an AusAID scholarship within the last two years.
- must not** be receiving a scholarship for which course tuition is a component under any other scholarship scheme to which the Australian Government makes a substantial contribution;
- must not** previously have received an EIPRS for a research doctorate degree;
- must not** previously have received an EIPRS for a Research Masters degree, unless:
 - that degree was completed and the student is undertaking a research doctorate degree; or
 - the student has converted their EIPRS under section: 'Conversion of Award' of the *Scholarship Conditions* at the end of this document;
- must** intend to commence full-time and on-campus study as early in 2011 as possible or if a Master by Research **before 31 March 2011**. Research Doctoral students may commence anytime in 2011. Awardees unable to commence by 31st March 2011 may be granted permission to commence at a later date;
- must not** currently be receiving another substantial scholarship provided by Edith Cowan University (for example, faculty, school or research centre scholarship) or an external provider.

An applicant will not be considered for or awarded an EIPRS unless ECU is satisfied that the applicant meets the conditions above. Where an applicant is expected to meet these conditions in good time then no payments will be made until the conditions are met.

AREAS OF RESEARCH STRENGTH

To be eligible to apply for an IPRS, applicants **MUST** intend to undertake research in an Area of Research Strength as defined below. Edith Cowan University's areas of research strengths are:

1. Health and Wellness

ECU's health research focuses on preventative health; early detection, intervention and rehabilitation and on developing strategies and programs which impact on community-wide health. Specific expertise exists in Alzheimer's Disease, covering onset, causes, treatment, and support mechanisms for both AD patients and the ageing. Multidisciplinary teams in exercise and sports science, nutrition and psychology are researching new wellness approaches to chronic disease management. Strong research centres exist in palliative cancer care, nursing, midwifery, Indigenous health, and child and adolescent health. Stem cell and melanoma research is also well advanced. ECU has nationally and internationally recognised health researchers, supported by extensive collaborations and partnerships.

2. Education

Education research and development at ECU is conducted in collaboration with state and national education bodies to improve policy, curriculum, teaching effectiveness and student learning outcomes. Particular strengths include improving the teaching of literacy, numeracy and science, behaviour management and the use of learning technologies to maximise learning outcomes. Other strengths include research on school resourcing, school effectiveness and the improvement of student retention and participation, especially for Indigenous students. ECU education researchers are recognised nationally, particularly for their expertise in research and program development in literacy and science teaching.

3. Environment and Sustainability

ECU's research encompasses biological and environmental areas and the interaction between ecology and human health. Specific areas of expertise include coastal marine and estuarine ecology, freshwater ecosystems, macroalgae and seagrass ecology, forest, woodland and wetland ecology, semi-arid environments, plant and animal ecological genetics, microbiology and biotechnology. Applied research addresses problems of minesite rehabilitation, habitat degradation, pollution, forest management and threatened species. A growing cross-disciplinary area is natural resources modelling and simulation.

4. Electronic Engineering and ICT

MicroPhotonics research at ECU is advancing electron and photon science and engineering and focussing on the development of integrated intelligent MicroPhotonic platforms that can be employed in Telecom, Health, Agriculture, Consumer Electronics, Energy, and Security. MicroPhotonics at ECU is centred around several research programs namely, Opto-VLSI, high-speed optoelectronics, lightwave testing, nano-engineered materials and structures, RF-photonics, adaptive optics, remote sensing and reconfigurable systems. Research in visual information processing includes signal and image processing, video communications, neural networks, pattern recognition and motion detection. Research is also undertaken in software engineering, computer network and information security, intelligence systems and information and knowledge management.

5. Social and Community

ECU's social and community research includes Indigenous studies, applied social research and political science. Indigenous studies include Indigenous health, education, mission and colonial history, Aboriginal linguistics and policy issues. Applied social research and evaluation among special populations (children and young people, women, people with disabilities, rural and regional), with a social justice focus, is also a significant research strength within the University. Research in psychology includes clinical, forensic, developmental, community and social psychology.

6. Business and Society

With a focus on business in society, nationally and internationally recognised researchers undertake a range of applied research that influences government policy, organisational behaviour and decision making, and develops frameworks, processes and skills for businesses and individuals. Areas of expertise include finance and capital markets in Australia and the Asia-Pacific region; financial behaviour, particularly related to superannuation; e-commerce and e-business; and small and medium enterprise research. Social marketing research concentrates on issues such as mental health, positive parenting, and positive ageing. Sustainable tourism research focuses on social and environmental impacts of tourism, sustainable destination management and eco-tourism.

Areas of Opportunity

1. Communications and Creative Arts

ECU's research in communications and creative arts combines traditional research paradigms in communications with an emerging focus on practice-led research in the creative arts. Communications research includes the social and cultural implications of the media and technology, audience studies and ratings research, and the implications of communication in building community. Researchers in the creative arts have been pro-active in the development of a practice-based research culture; outputs include public exhibitions, performances, musical recordings, installations, and publications. Specific strengths exist in movement and sound, the visual and performing arts, new media and creative writing.

2. Security, Law and Justice

ECU's security research includes information security, computer and network security, biometrics and ballistics imaging, critical infrastructure, aviation and border control security, counter-terrorism, intelligence and risk management. Particular strengths include digital forensics, forensic analysis of network and mobile device data, and information operations and terrorism. Law and criminology research includes the administration of justice, investigative interviewing, minority interests and human rights, family legal issues, ethics and legal reform. Other research includes scientific evidence and advocacy, forensic psychology, and employment and property law.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY

All applicants for admission into ECU postgraduate courses are required to meet an English Language Proficiency requirement as well as general academic entry.

Please note that there may be visa implications depending on the type of English language testing an applicant undertakes (ie, in some countries an IELTS score may be required before visa approval). Please contact ECU International to inquire about this (international@ecu.edu.au or on-line at <http://www.ecu.edu.au/international/index.html>).

▪ Acceptable English Language Tests (Minimum Scores)

▪ Time Validity of Results

- A score in a formal English Language test (IELTS, TOEFL) is valid for a maximum of two years after completion of the test. Cambridge tests are normally guaranteed for the student’s lifetime.
- English language competency claims from school-level or post-secondary studies should be based on studies completed no more than three years prior to admission (unless there is evidence of satisfactory communication in the English medium after completion of formal studies).

▪ Section Three – Research Output (up to 5 points)

For multiple authors only pro-rata points awarded. No points awarded where verification documents have not been submitted or where no English translation has been provided along with non-English documents.

The allocation of unit values to publications in this section will be based on an assessment of the quality of the publication by Faculty Research and Higher Degrees Committee (RHD) and the Research Student and Scholarships Committee (RSSC).

Points can only be allocated once in either section 1, 2 or 3.

*A score from this section will only be used to separate eligible applicants in the University Order of Merit List who have tied scores.

Based on the above ranking scheme each faculty will produce an Order of Merit list which will be combined to form a University Order of Merit list. First round offers are then made in accordance with these lists. Remaining applicants that are eligible for admission but are not made a first round offer due to the limited availability of scholarships may be placed on a *reserve list* to be considered for a scholarship in the event of a scholarship later becoming available. Ineligible applicants shall be advised in writing of the outcome of their application.

ASSESSMENT OF OVERSEAS QUALIFICATIONS

APPLICATION DOCUMENTATION

▪ Scholarship Application Form

Applicants must complete and submit an *Endeavour International Postgraduate Research Scholarship Application* form. They must ensure that all documentation requested is attached to their application at the time of submission. ▪ Course Admission

Applicants applying for an Endeavour International Postgraduate Research Scholarship (EIPRS) are also required to apply for their preferred course if they have not already done so. Information about admission to ECU is available from: <http://www.ecu.edu.au/international/index.html> and you can apply for course admission by going to <http://www.ecu.edu.au/international/admissions/scholarships.html> (click "Apply Online Now!").

It is highly recommended that prospective applicants for research courses contact the relevant coordinator to discuss their intended area of research and the availability of supervision prior to lodging an application. A list of coordinators is available at the end of this document.

Please note: due to the number of applicants there is no guarantee of supervision. Supervisors will be determined by the Faculty once all applications have been assessed. A list of coordinators is available at the end of this document.

▪ Academic Referee Report Forms

It is highly recommended that each applicant must make arrangements for the provision of **two** (2) academic referee's reports. Academic Referee Reports may be used in the assessment process of a scholarship application. Report forms are available on-line at: <http://www.ecu.edu.au/ecu-scholarships/overview> or by request to scholarships@ecu.edu.au

It is the applicant's responsibility to ensure that both referee reports are returned to the Research Scholarships Officer by **31st August 2010**. **An application may be adversely affected if the Research Scholarships Officer does not receive these reports.**

▪ Academic Qualifications

Applicants must provide the original **or certified** copies of academic documentation, including academic transcripts² and proof of completion from any tertiary qualification unless it was completed at ECU.

▪ Certified Qualifications and Documentation

If academic qualifications were obtained at an institution other than ECU formally certified copies of documentation must be included with your application. Original documents that are submitted by mail will be returned to the applicant upon request.

Documents can be certified by:

- Edith Cowan University
- The official records department of the institution that originally issued the documents.
- The Admissions Office or Student Administration of any Australian University
- Within Australia, anyone who is currently employed as a: Justice of the Peace; Commissioner of Declarations; registered accountant; pharmacist/chemist; credit union/bank branch manager; barrister, solicitor or attorney; police officer in charge of a police station (minimum rank of sergeant); medical practitioner; postal manager; principal of an Australian college or primary/high school.

² An academic transcript outlines all the units undertaken and the grade obtained for each unit.

- The administration office of any Australian TAFE College.
- The Western Australian Tertiary Institutions Service Centre (TISC), Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre, South Australian Admissions Centre, Universities Admissions Centre (NSW and ACT) or Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre.

Applicants are advised that the authorised officer should verify each document by writing ‘*This is a true copy of the original document sighted by me*’, then signing the statement printing their name, address, contact telephone number, profession or occupation or organisation, date verified and including the official stamp or seal of the verifier’s organisation on the copy.

▪ Graduated Status

All graduates should ensure their documents clearly show “Course Completed” or “Graduated” status. If documents do not indicate course completed/graduated status then a **certified** ‘Letter of Completion’ from the institution should be provided. This letter should clearly state the level of honours, if applicable.

Pending graduates must clearly indicate when they expect to attain graduated status.

Please note that a qualifying degree must be completed by **13 October 2010** for an applicant to be considered for an IPRS scholarship. If the Research Scholarships Officer has not received evidence of the degree completion by this date, a first round scholarship offer will not normally be considered.

▪ Documents presented in a language other than English

It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that all documentation presented in a foreign language is also accompanied by an authorised English translation. This means that applicants must provide certified copies of the qualification or documentation in the original language as well as a certified English translation.

▪ Proof of Name (if changed)

If applying for admission &/or scholarship in a name different to that shown on your documents, **certified** proof of a change of name must be attached (such as a Marriage Certificate or Deed Poll).

▪ Research Experience Documentation

An applicant’s research experience will be taken into consideration in the assessment of applications for scholarship. Applicants are required to **provide evidence** of any research grants received or research that has been published. Only correspondence/documentation that is in English or has been translated into English can be considered. The documentation requirements are as follows:

Articles awaiting publication

Applicants that are awaiting confirmation of publication of journal articles, books, manuscripts etc. are advised that they should note this in their CV and list of publications. Included with the scholarship application should be all the documentation as noted above to support the article *together with* a note advising confirmation of publication is pending. If verification of publication is then able to be supplied to the Research Scholarships Officer before **13 October 2010** then we are able to include this verification with your application.

APPLICATION CLOSING DATE

Applications close on **31 August 2010**. No late applications will be accepted. Applicants must take postal time into account when submitting their application and, if in doubt, we suggest the use of a reliable courier company.
